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MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

This section of the Board's financial report represents Management's analysis of the Board's financial performance during the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016. Please read it in conjunction with the financial statements which follow this section.

Financial Highlights

During 2017, the Board's net position increased by \$12,451 or 9.2%, due to operating revenues exceeding operating expenses. During 2016, the Board's net position increased by \$7,452, or 5.8%, due to operating revenues exceeding operating expenses.

During 2017 the operating revenues of the Board increased by \$9,932, or 11.9%, due primarily to an increase in initial license fees and renewal fees. During 2016, the operating revenues of the Board decreased by \$2,819, or 3.3%, due primarily to a decrease in initial license fees.

During 2017, the non-operating revenues of the Board decreased by \$126, or 13.0%, due to a decreased amount of cash being held in interest bearing accounts during the year. During 2016, the non-operating revenues of the Board increased by \$194, or 25.1%, due to an increased amount of cash being held in interest bearing accounts during the year.

During 2017, the operating expenses of the Board increased by \$4,807, or 6.2%, due primarily to an increase in contractual management service fees (which resulted from an increase in revenues). During 2016, the operating expenses of the Board increased by \$4,624, or 6.4%, due primarily to an increase in legal fees.

Overview of the Financial Statements

This financial report consists of two sections: Management's Discussion and Analysis and the Financial Statements. The Board has no other supplementary information required by Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34. The Financial Statements also include notes to the financial statements that provide detail of the information included in the financial statements.

The financial statements of the Board report information about the Board using accounting methods similar to those used by private sector companies. These statements offer short and long-term financial information about the activities of the Board.

The Statements of Net Position present the current and long-term portions of assets and liabilities separately. The Statements of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position present information on how the Board's assets changed as a result of its operations. The Statements of Cash Flows present information on how the Board's cash changed as a result of its financial activities.

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the North Carolina Interpreter and Transliterator Licensing Board (the "Board"), an independent state agency which is a nonmajor enterprise fund of the primary government of the State of North Carolina, as of and for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which comprise the Board's financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on the audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Note 1 - Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

Description of Organization and Purpose

The North Carolina Interpreter and Transliterator Licensing Board (the "Board") is an independent State agency. It is an occupational licensing board and is authorized by Chapter 90D of the North Carolina General Statutes. The Board is composed of nine members who are appointed by the Governor and the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina. It is a nonmajor enterprise fund of the primary government of the State of North Carolina and is reported as such in the State's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).

The Board is established to maintain minimum standards for services provided by interpreters and transliterators.

The Board's operations are financed with self-generated revenues from fees charged to licensees.

Financial Reporting Entity

The concept underlying the definition of the financial reporting entity is that elected officials are accountable to their constituents for their actions. As required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP), the financial reporting entity includes both the primary government and all of its component units. An organization other than a primary government serves as a nucleus for a reporting entity when it issues separate financial statements. The accompanying financial statements present all funds and activities for which the Board is responsible.

For financial reporting purposes, the Board is a nonmajor enterprise fund of the primary government of the State of North Carolina and is reported as such in the State's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR). These financial statements for the Board are separate and apart from those of the State of North Carolina and do not present the financial position of the State nor changes in the State's financial position and cash flows.

Basis of Presentation

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting principles and reporting standards.

All activities of the Board are accounted for within a single proprietary (enterprise) fund. Proprietary funds are used to account for operations that are financed and operated in a manner similar to private business enterprises where the intent of the governing body is that the cost of providing goods or services to the general public on a continuing basis be financed or recovered primarily through user charges.

Note 1 - Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Basis of Accounting

The basic financial statements of the Board are prepared using the economic resource measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. The economic resource measurement focus measures all assets that are available to the entity, not only cash or soon to be assets. Both long-term assets and long-term liabilities are measured and depreciation is recorded as a cost of operations. Under the accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recognized when earned, and expenses are recorded when a liability has been incurred, regardless of the timing of cash flows. Fees received for the various licenses are deemed earned when the license period begins.

The Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position classifies the Board's revenues as operating or non-operating revenues. Operating revenues and expenses consist of those revenues and expenses that result from the ongoing principal operations of the Board. Operating revenues consist primarily of license fees and includes activities that have characteristics of exchange transactions. Operating expenses are all expense transactions incurred other than those related to capital and noncapital financing or investing activities as defined by GASB Statement No. 9, *Reporting Cash Flows of Proprietary and Nonexpendable Trust Funds and Governmental Entities That Use Proprietary Fund Accounting*. Nonoperating revenues and expenses consist of those revenues and expenses that are related to investing, capital, and non-capital financing activities; and are classified as non-operating in the financial statements.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

This classification includes undeposited receipts, petty cash, checking accounts and time deposits held by the Board (if any).

Prepaid Expense

This classification includes management agency fees which were prepaid at year end which related to unearned revenue. See Note 6 for further explanation.

Capital Assets

Capital assets are stated at cost and are being depreciated over their useful lives on a straight-line basis. The Board capitalizes assets that have a value or cost of \$500 or greater at the date of acquisition and an estimated useful life of more than one year. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method of depreciation over the estimated useful lives of the assets, generally estimated as follows: office furniture and equipment, 5 to 7 years.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Note 2 - Deposits

All of the Board's deposits which are uninsured are uncollateralized [unless collateralized pursuant to NC Administrative Code (20 NCAC 7)] by the financial institution holding said deposits. For deposits, custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of the failure of the depository (or counterparty), the Board will not be able to recover the value of its deposits that are in the possession of the outside party. The Board does not have formal written policies regarding custodial credit risk for deposits.

At September 30, 2017, the Board's deposits (including undeposited receipts on hand) had a carrying amount of \$218,316 and a bank balance of \$218,223, which was covered by federal depository insurance. At September 30, 2016, the Board's deposits (including undeposited receipts on hand) had a carrying amount of \$212,934 and a bank balance of \$212,934, which was covered by federal depository insurance.

When an asset is disposed of, the cost of the asset and the related accumulated depreciation are removed from the books. Any gain or loss on disposition is reflected in earnings for the period. Depreciation expense was \$49 for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2017 and \$58 for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2016

Note 4 - Unearned Revenue

The Board's fees are assessed and collected on an annual basis for the period October 1 through September 30, which corresponds with the Board's accounting period. License renewal fees received in the latter part of the fiscal year are deferred and recognized as revenue over the one year period to which they relate.

Note 5 - Net Position

Investment in capital assets - This component of net position consists of capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation.

Restricted net position - This component of net position consists of net position which the Board is legally or contractually obligated to spend in accordance with restrictions imposed by external parties. The Board had no restricted net position at year end.

Unrestricted net position - This component of net position consists of net position that does not meet the definition of *restricted or investment in capital assets*.

Note 6 - Contractual Management Services and Related Prepaid Expense

The Board does not have any employees. The Board contracts with a management consultant service to provide services for the Board. The management service fee is calculated as a percentage (55%) of certain revenues collected during the period. The contract includes all services related to the process of licensure application and renewal and various other secretarial duties. The Board also reimburses the management service for printing, copying, postage and miscellaneous office supplies and expenses. Payments to the management service (including adjustments for prepaid expense, discussed below) totaled \$52,612 during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2017 and \$46,997 (including adjustments for prepaid expense, discussed below) during the fiscal year ended September 30, 2016.

Since management fees are calculated as a percentage of certain income collected, when revenue collected during a period is deferred and recognized in a future period, the management fees related to the collection of that unearned revenue should be deferred and recognized as expense in that future period that the revenue is recognized. Accordingly, management fees paid and accrued, which relate to unearned income, are recorded as prepaid expense - management fees (an asset) on the Statements of Net Position, and is recognized as expense in the period that the revenue is recognized.

The Board and management consultant service changed its contract to a fixed monthly contract fee of \$3,925 per month beginning December 1, 2017 (for a one year contract period).

Note 7 - Risk Management

The Board is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and the destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. These exposures to loss are handled by participation in certain state-administered risk programs and self retention of certain risks. The Board has not purchased any commercial insurance coverage.

Note 8 - Contingencies

The Board is involved in occasional disciplinary hearings throughout the year which arise in the ordinary course of its operations. In the opinion of management of the Board, the results of such actions during the years under audit do not materially affect the Board's operations, changes in financial position, or cash flows for the years herein ended.

Note 9 - Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through December 21, 2017, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. Events occurring after that date have not been evaluated to determine whether a change in the financial statements would be required.

Note 10 - North Carolina Legislative Statutory Disclosure Requirement Concerning Audit Fees

This audit required 46 audit hours at a cost of \$4,395.
