This report presents the results of the financial statement audit of the Hyde County Partnership for Children for the year ended June 30, 2001. Crisp Hughes Evans LLP performed the audit under contract with the Office of the State Auditor, and their report is submitted herewith.

The audit of the Hyde County Partnership for Children was made in conjunction with the Early Childhood Initiatives (Smart Start) program authorized by G.S. 143B-168.10-.16. This statute created the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc. and required the implementation of local partnerships. The Hyde County Partnership for Children is one of these local partnerships. As such, the Hyde County Partnership for Children is a private nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization and is required by G.S. 143B-168.14 to have an annual financial and compliance audit conducted by the State Auditor. The State Auditor's authority to perform or coordinate all audit functions for state government is set forth in Article 5 of Chapter 147 of the North Carolina General Statutes.

The significant Smart Start expansion authorized in the 1998 fiscal year almost doubled the related audit burden placed on the Office of the State Auditor. Therefore, the General Assembly, in its 1998-99 Expansion Budget, gave recognition to the resources needed to provide the audit oversight required by statute. Those resources incorporated a combination of permanent positions and contract funding to make the Smart Start audit effort self-sustaining.

North Carolina General Statutes require the State Auditor to make audit reports available to the public. Copies of all audit reports issued by the Office of the State Auditor may be obtained through one of the options listed in the back of this report.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Board of Directors Hyde County Partnership for Children Swan Quarter, North Carolina

We have audited the accompanying Statement of Receipts, Expenditures, and Net Assets - Regulatory Basis of the Hyde County Partnership for Children (Hyde Partnership) as of June 30, 2001, and the related Statement of Functional Expenditures - Regulatory Basis for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Hyde Partnership's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the accompanying financial statements were prepared on the regulatory basis of accounting as prescribed by the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the net assets of the Hyde County Partnership for Children as of June 30, 2001, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT (CONCLUDED)

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated February 13, 2002 on our consideration of the Hyde Partnership's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be read in conjunction with the independent auditor's report in considering the results of our audit.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements of the Hyde County Partnership for Children taken as a whole. The accompanying supplementary schedules are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. The information in these schedules has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the management of the partnership, the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., the Governor, and the General Assembly and is not intended to be, and should not be, used by anyone other than these specified parties.

HYDE COUNTY PARTNERSHIP FOR CHILDREN NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS JUNE 30, 2001

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- **A. Organization and Purpose** The Hyde County Partnership for Children (Hyde Partnership) is a legally separate nonprofit organization incorporated on April 17, 1998. The Hyde Partnership was established to develop and provide, through public and private means, early childhood education and developmental services for children and families. The Hyde Partnership is tax-exempt as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- **B.** Basis of Presentation The accompanying financial statements present all funds for which the Hyde Partnership's Board of Directors is responsible. In accordance with Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations," the accompanying financial statements present information according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. As permitted by this Statement, temporarily restricted contributions received and expended in the same year are reported as unrestricted receipts rather than as temporarily restricted receipts.

The Hyde Partnership did not have any temporarily or permanently restricted net assets at June 30, 2001.

C. Basis of Accounting - The accompanying financial statements were prepared on the regulatory basis of accounting as prescribed by the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc. This basis differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America primarily because it recognizes long lived assets and other costs which benefit more than one period as expended in the year purchased; it recognizes revenue when received rather than when earned; and it recognizes expenditures when paid rather than when incurred.

However, unexpended advances to contractors that revert back to the State are recognized as a reduction to expenditures and an increase to net assets. In addition, amounts withheld from employee paychecks or other amounts received in an agency capacity are recorded as funds held for others.

D. Funds Held For Others - Funds held for others includes amounts received that are fiduciary in nature in which the Partnership acts in an agency

capacity. For the year ended, the Hyde Partnership was holding amounts withheld from employee paychecks for distribution to taxing authorities.

NOTE 2 - DEPOSITS

All funds of the Hyde Partnership are deposited with one commercial bank and insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$100,000. Deposits over this amount subject the Hyde Partnership to a concentration of credit risk.

NOTE 3 - FUNDING FROM GRANT AWARDS

Smart Start Program - The Hyde Partnership's major source of revenue and support is from the State of North Carolina based on cost-reimbursement contracts with the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc. (NCPC) for the Smart Start Program. A significant reduction in the level of funding from the State could have an adverse effect on the operations of the Hyde Partnership and represents a concentration of credit risk as to the generation of revenue.

Associated with these contracts, the Hyde Partnership is responsible for developing a comprehensive, collaborative, long-range plan of services to children and families for the service-delivery area. During the year, the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) entered into contracts with and made payments to service providers selected by the Hyde Partnership. These service provider contracts are not reflected on the accompanying financial statement. However, a summary of the service provider contracts entered into by DHHS is presented on Schedule 2 accompanying the financial statements.

The Hyde Partnership was awarded \$123,735 and has received \$121,735 under a current year Smart Start contract with NCPC. The unexpended balance of this contract is subject to reversion to the State. The Partnership has returned \$18,600 of this contract to the State as a voluntary reversion prior to June 30, 2001 and \$3,574 based on financial status reports submitted to NCPC subsequent to June 30, 2001.

The Partnership expects to receive continued funding through new Smart Start contracts with the State.

Support Our Students Program (SOS) - The Hyde Partnership also received revenue and support from the State of North Carolina based on a cost-reimbursement contract with DHHS for the Support our Students Program.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

The Hyde Partnership was awarded \$18,750 under a current year SOS contract with DHHS. The unexpended balance of this contract is subject to reversion to the State. The Partnership expects to receive continued funding through new SOS Program contracts with the State.

NOTE 4 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Service Provider Contracts with Board Member Organizations - The board members of the Hyde Partnership are representative of various organizations that benefit from actions taken by the Board. It is the policy of the Hyde Partnership that board members not be involved with decisions regarding organizations they represent. During the year, the Partnership entered into contracts with board member organizations for program activities as identified on Schedule 1 accompanying the financial statements. In addition, Schedule 2 identifies contracts entered into by DHHS with board member organizations for activities funded by the Partnership's Smart Start Allocation.

NOTE 5 - FUNCTIONAL EXPENDITURES

The costs of providing the various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Receipts, Expenditures, and Net Assets - Regulatory Basis. Also, the Statement of Functional Expenditures - Regulatory Basis provides detail of the functional costs by their natural classification. Following are the services associated with the functional categories presented in the accompanying financial statements:

A. Program Functions

Child Care and Education Quality - Used to account for service activities including program upgrade projects, early education enhancement programs, and child care provider support.

Child Care and Education Affordability - Used to account for service activities including expand child care eligibility, public preschool classes, Head Start summer program and supplement for quality.

Health and Safety - Used to account for service activities associated with outreach materials.

Support Our Students - Used to account for service activities including the providing of high quality after-school activities for school-aged children.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONCLUDED)

B. Support Functions

Management and General - Expenditures that are not identifiable with a single program or fund-raising activity but are indispensable to the conduct of those activities and to an organization's existence, including expenditures for the overall direction of the organization, its general board activities, business management, general recordkeeping, budgeting, and related purposes.

Program Evaluation - Expenditures that are incurred to monitor the performance of service providers as to the delivery of services and adherence to the specific terms and conditions of the contracts.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT ON COMPLIANCE AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING BASED ON AN AUDIT OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

Board of Directors Hyde County Partnership for Children Swan Quarter, North Carolina

We have audited the financial statements of the Hyde County Partnership for Children (Hyde Partnership) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2001, and have issued our report thereon dated February 13, 2002. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Hyde Partnership's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Hyde Partnership's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purposes of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. However, we noted certain matters involving the internal control over financial reporting and its operation that we consider to be reportable conditions. Reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the

design or operation of the internal control over financial reporting that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Hyde Partnership's ability to record, process, summarize and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. Those reportable conditions noted as a result of our audit are described in the Audit Findings and Recommendations section of this report:

- 1. CONTROL ENVIRONMENT
- 2. CONTRACT MANAGEMENT AND MONITORING

A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses. However, of the reportable conditions described above, we consider the following to be a material weakness.

2 CONTRACT MANAGEMENT AND MONITORING

We also noted another matter involving an issue of a management control nature that is described in the Audit Findings and Recommendations section of this report.

AUDIT FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Material Findings and Recommendations from Prior Audits - The following presents the status of material findings and recommendations presented in the prior year audit report that affected the current year audit of the financial statements.

1. CONTROL ENVIRONMENT

The auditor reported in the prior year that the Board had not effectively addressed issues related to the Hyde Partnership's control environment including policies and procedures, staffing, and processing of transactions.

This finding is partially resolved. The Board has placed appropriate emphasis on establishing policies and procedures as guidance for the Partnership staff to ensure fiscal accountability. However, we noted that the administrative assistant receives the mail, logs the deposits, and makes the deposits. Due to the size of the Partnership, segregation of duties is difficult, but Partnership management should be aware that these functions need to be segregated as much as possible.

Partnership response: Due to only a two-person staff, duties are now segregated as follows: Administrative Assistant receives mail; checks for deposit are then routed to Executive Director for documentation of receipt and returned to Administrative Assistant for deposit. Deposit code sheet is prepared by Administrative Assistant, approved by Executive Director, and then sent to accountant

Material Findings and Recommendations from the Current Audit - The following presents a finding and recommendation, determined during the current audit, which represents a significant deficiency in internal controls.

2. CONTRACT MANAGEMENT AND MONITORING

The Hyde Partnership lacked an adequate contract management and monitoring system. The following conditions were noted during the current audit:

- Written policies and procedures for contract management and monitoring had not been established and adopted by the Board until June 2001.
- Evidence to support the monitoring of contract activities was not available.
- No documentation was available to support the site visits that had been made by Partnership staff.

The achievement of the Hyde Partnership's goals is dependent on the effectiveness of its contract management system and its monitoring of contractor performance.

AUDIT FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS (CONCLUDED)

Recommendation: We recommend the Hyde Partnership develop and implement contract management and monitoring policies and procedures. Such procedures should address the development of an adequate contract management and monitoring system, and proper documentation of the Partnership's monitoring activities that are to begin.

Partnership's Response: Since the adoption of contract management and monitoring policies and procedures in June 2001, staff has been minimal, at times with only the ED available. We now have competent staffing of an Administrative Assistant, in addition to the ED and duties are being delineated accordingly.

All site visits to service providers are now recorded in each provider file. Program and fiscal monitoring visits are now being documented and placed in appropriate files.
